## Volunteer for new coordinator required

It is amazing what has been achieved considering we are still in the same small unit and that the number of Time givers has not changed in 6 years although there are several fresh faces!

We have always said "we can only do what we are able to do" but more clearly it is what God enables us to do in the time we give to him.

The main specifics of the role currently are:

- Core team prayer meeting (currently Monday morning for an hour at 9.30am)
- Managing the phone including calls, texts, WhatsApp, and emails (currently Monday to Thursday)
- Arranging assessments for both recipients and donors
- 4) Completing assessments
- 5) Putting a plan together for the Time givers for a Thursday

The new coordinator would be able to develop the role in their own way. The important thing is to pray and listen for Gods guidance.
